



The Muslim Chaplaincy at UIC (MCUIC) provides religious, spiritual, educational, and social support to the Muslim population on campus, advocates for the needs of Muslim students, and works to build bridges across the diverse communities that make up the fabric of life at UIC. Our services include one-on-one pastoral care, advocacy, consulting, and community programming.

Vision & Values

MCUIC seeks to foster a space where members of the UIC community can learn about and practice their faith freely, engage and connect with the diversity of the Muslim community in an inclusive and welcoming environment, and gain a deeper understanding of Islam and Muslims. We serve all Muslim students at UIC, regardless of sect, ethnicity, nationality, gender, sexuality, race, class, ability, and degree of religiosity. MCUIC also strives to be a spiritual care and wellness resource for the UIC student body as a whole.

MEET THE CHAPLAIN



Chaplain Ariz Saleem holds a Master of Divinity in Islamic Chaplaincy from the University of Chicago and has completed two units of Certified Pastoral Education. His divinity studies afforded him an opportunity to gain a broad survey of the Islamic intellectual heritage, including readings in early Islamic texts, like the Sirat of Ibn Hisham to reviewing works by later scholars like al-Muhasibi, al-Ghazzali, Ibn Taymiyya, and al-Tilimsani.

Prior to his graduate studies, Chaplain Ariz traveled to Egypt for nine months in 2015, centering the study of Classical Arabic and completing a course on the science of Tajweed. While there, he also received lessons in fundamental Islamic Sciences. He continues to augment his knowledge of the Classical Islamic Sciences along with the academic study of Islam. Chaplain Ariz has had a diverse set of work experiences ranging from Benefits Administration in Corporate America to Community Organizing for ICNA Relief. He has prior chaplaincy experience at Loyola University, Rush University Hospital, and Cook County Jail.

Chaplain Ariz's academic interests include the intersection of Islamic spirituality and psychology. His hobbies include writing and reciting poetry, playing basketball, and spending time in nature.



HOW WAS PASTORAL CARE OR SUPPORT FROM THE CHAPLAIN BENEFICIAL FOR YOU IN YOUR JOURNEY?

Over the Fall 2023 semester, I began meeting with the chaplain regularly to essentially relearn Islam, this time through the lens of mercy and nurturing care. These sessions covered various topics, including Islamic rulings, Muslim identity in the West, navigating familial issues, Ouranic tafsir, memorization of Islamic attributes, and intersectionality as a Muslim. In less than four months, I experienced a transformation, becoming a better version of myself with the chaplain's unwavering guidance and mentorship. His commitment to my learning journey provided the foundation I needed to re-embrace my Muslim identity confidently, begin observing hijab, and deepen my understanding of Islam both fundamentally and personally. The chaplain went above and beyond, even meeting virtually during the summer to support my learning. He worked with me to create a personalized study plan, ensuring I could continue my growth at my own pace.

LOOKING AHEAD TO FUTURE GOALS

INDEPENDENT MCUIC SPACE

The Chaplaincy will eventually need an independent space that is accessible to undergraduate and graduate students that can serve as a central place for worship, spiritual and educational programming, companionship building, and pastoral services vis a vis the Chaplain's office. Having an independent space would resolve issues like room-booking and campus food restrictions, providing greater agency to the Chaplaincy.

HALAL ON CAMPUS

One of the efforts the Muslim Chaplaincy hopes to bring to fruition is raising the standard of halal-certification to hand-slaughtered meat, so that all of our students can benefit from the halal dining options available on campus. With assistance from the community, the additional expenses associated with a higher standard can be off-set, making more inclusive dietary options a reality for our students.





PART-TIME FEMALE CHAPLAIN

While the chaplain currently serves all members of the Muslim student body on campus in equal capacity, there would be great benefit for female-students to have access to a part-time female chaplain who may address their needs on a more personal matter or with whom they can fashion a more intimate relationship.
